Welcome to our Patron-in-Chief



We are delighted to announce that The Lord-Lieutenant of East Sussex, Mr Andrew Blackman, has been appointed Patron-in-Chief for Raystede.

Mr Blackman first visited Raystede in May 2022 to celebrate her late Majesty The Queen's Platinum Jubilee and our own 70th anniversary. During his visit, he met staff and volunteers and planted an English Oak tree as part of the celebrations and the Queen's Green Canopy to plant a million trees in a living and lasting legacy to her.

Stephanie Smith, CEO, says:

"We are very proud that the Lord-Lieutenant of East Sussex has agreed to become our Patron-in-Chief. It was such a pleasure to welcome him to Raystede last year, to see his love of animals and his interest in and support for our work.

We are all really looking forward to working with him to help more animals in our local community."

Andrew Blackman was appointed to be His Majesty's Lord-Lieutenant for East Sussex on 18 August 2021. Andrew Blackman is a former art dealer who has previously served as High Sheriff.

He was an Ambassador for the Sussex Community Foundation; a committee member of the Order of St Richard, which recognises the contribution of lay people in the service of the church; a former Chair of the Friends of Hastings Country Park; and a former trustee of the Peasmarsh Chamber Music Festival. He has also sat on the Board of Appeals for St Michael's Hospice and the Conquest Hospital. Mr Blackman lives in Fairlight, near Hastings, with his husband Richard Smith.

Animal Welfare: Matt Gough



Spring just about feels to be in the air and looking into my crystal ball at the rest of 2023, I'm feeling quite positive. Rehoming of cats and small animals in particular has rebounded to a good level and it is starting to feel like people have begun to settle into the new social landscape brought by the cost-of-living crisis. Hopefully, that will mean people feel better prepared to give homes to rescue animals including more of our dogs as the months go by.

All being well, you should see increased activity around the site of the terrapin project in the coming weeks. We have just received planning permission so it will be full steam ahead. You might have noticed some small trees and scrub being removed from around the site which was necessary to clear the area for new fencing to be installed. At the same time, you may also have noticed the Estates Team planting new hedgerows with volunteer groups in the double fenced areas at the edge of some of the equine paddocks. These were planted to provide browse for the animals as they grow through the fences, create natural windbreaks, and to be of benefit to wildlife. That means that although we have lost a handful of immature trees in the Sanctuary, they have been replaced by many hundreds of trees elsewhere on site.

Thank you all for your continued support, here's hoping 2023 will be a much more positive year for animals.

Rehoming: Miriam Dowding

It's busy in Rehoming for surrender requests at the moment. We were asked to take 121 dogs in January, compared with 63 in January 2022. Break Away is still quiet, but we recently had a cat called Belle join the scheme and she is doing well in her foster home.

We have recently recruited four new casual Multi-Section Animal Care Assistants (MSACA): Olive, Sharon, Sapphire, and Amanda. Charlotte - a new full time MSACA started with us in March.

Tortoises awake!

When you are on the Small Animals Team, you know that Spring has arrived when the tortoises wake up from hibernation.

All our tortoises have made it through another winter safely and have even had the opportunity to make their first outings of the year into their gardens. Once the warmer weather arrives, they will be allowed outside more often to graze and enjoy the natural sunshine.







Rabbits

There is a nationwide crisis with unwanted rabbits and we are currently overflowing with them, but the team didn't hesitate when we were asked to help with an out-of-control breeding situation. We have welcomed seven giant breed bunnies which consist of a mum, her female companion and five 3 week-old babies!

Baby rabbits don't stay babies for long so we are making the most of their cuteness.

If you can't find any of the WFS team that is where we will be! This takes our total number of bunnies on site to 28.



Avian Havens

You may have passed our new avian flu enclosures within the sanctuary areas during your wanders around the site or on our RED talks. Three permanent structures were built as avian flu is now becoming a yearly and potentially fatal threat, the structures protect our poultry and waterfowl from wild birds as cross contamination can occur from sharing food and water sources or contact with infected droppings.

The permanent enclosures have made life much easier for the team; after our WFS-built enclosures collapsed during Storm Eunice last year, we discovered that none of us are keen architects!

Good News!

Although we have been extremely busy over the last few months, we have had a lot of rehoming successes which have seen all our mice being rehomed (this time last year we had over 30) and all but two of the 38 hoarder guinea pigs from last year have been rehomed.

Thankfully, in some ways there are few things to report for this newsletter. Touch wood, most things are relatively calm.

We have some parrots feeling rather broody though. Some have laid eggs and some are using a toy, such as a small ball or a Lego cube to sit on. This is creating behavioural issues for the staff in some cases, but generally we are managing them OK and getting our cleaning done.

Thankfully, we have a working pump again, which is a godsend as we have suffered physically having to go back to basics lugging water containers, buckets and watering cans around to clean and provide drinking water. I am sure we will gradually recover but we have all been feeling the strain one way or another, so we are very grateful as we had six weeks of it!

We have had some work done to try to deal with rainwater getting indoors in the African Grey colony aviary, but the drainpipes added have made no difference, so back to the drawing board I'm afraid, which is very frustrating. During heavy rain and strong winds, it has been quite depressing for this group as they try to find a dry area to roost - somehow the water is getting in somewhere.

Well, the days are getting longer and we are trying to feel a little more optimistic. Olly has taken to looking at the world from a different perspective, so we wanted to add this photo for all to see! What a superstar he is!

We have been busy neutering here in the surgery. We have now had all of Pixie's puppies from the summer in to be neutered, all seemed very settled and happy with their owners.

In February we had a busy couple of days neutering external cats, six boys and five girls in total, on top of the Raystede animals made for a busy week and we look forward to the next day in the winter.

Looking forward, we have a cat microchip day coming up again in April, helping people who cannot afford to get their cats microchipped privately. Onsite, the neutering of rabbits who came in in December is keeping us busy. Hopefully they will all find homes soon.

Kitten season came early for us this year. At the time of writing, we have three queens with litters of varying sizes, and one pregnant cat who we are eagerly waiting on to give birth. Georgie, a stray long-haired tabby, who we took in gave birth to two kittens on 28 February. Sadly, one of the kittens didn't make it, so her remaining baby, who we have named Dilly, is absolutely thriving as she has the monopoly on the milk bar! She's also living up to the tortoiseshell trait of being spicy – she was hissing at us before she was even a week old!

Also born on 28 February were Bubbles' three kittens. Bubbles, her kittens, and her two sisters, Blossom and Buttercup, are all currently living out in the Enrichment Room and enjoying the freedom of having the space to dash around and play (see picture on page three).

The Enrichment Room is functioning as a temporary 'Maternity Ward' while we wait for more kitten foster carers to be recruited.

Brother and sister pair, Queenie and Luigi, came to us unneutered and at one year old, you can guess how that ended! Queenie gave birth to four healthy kittens on 8 March. We are hoping to send the proud parents and the four babies to foster soon. They will stay in foster until the kittens are around eight weeks old. This is when they are ready to leave their mum, be vaccinated, microchipped and find their new homes. The kittens come back to us for their neuter operations at around 12 weeks old.

Jessie is keeping us all waiting to see when she will give birth to her litter. She had an ultrasound with Alice and we saw a kitten spine, skull and heart. It was tricky to get a clear picture of how many she will have as we didn't want to shave Jessie's fur just for the purpose of the ultrasound. So, we are taking bets!

We are also very busy with adult and senior cats, many of whom are finding their forever homes in good time. Our current longest stays are Rosie and Petra, 15 year old sisters, who have been with us since November.

The girls are spending time in a foster home while they wait for their perfect person to come along. As you can see from the photos, they are absolutely loving having all the home comforts they desire.






The whole team spent hours of their days sitting with Bob trying to get him to eat, but due to Bob being a very sensitive and independent alpaca that didn't like human interaction, this was very difficult for him. We can just be thankful that he is out of pain and in a better place.

He had been with his previous owners for the past ten years but due to a change of circumstances and loss of land, he needed to be rehomed. He is a Welsh pony who is 22 years young. He is very sweet-natured and will stand all day being groomed without making a fuss. You will currently find him mixing with our pony herd.

Whizz is out in the field overnight with Sally, Pixie, Oscar and Saul however, he cannot be turned out with Cherry or Purdie as he gets too excited. No health issues have been discovered with Whizz, indicating he is happy and healthy. Thus, suggesting he is ready for his forever home to love him as much as we do.



The white Wiltshire Long Horn boys have been rehomed to a lovely personal smallholding just down the road in Chiddingly. It is so amazing that we managed to get these boys a home due to them still being so young and the rest of our flock being elderly. It allows them to have a full enriched life with a flock closer to them in age. They are now happily living with five other sheep and a goat called Millie.

Trustee Board: News and information

Q&A with Derwyn Jones, Chair of Trustees

Derwyn Jones joined Raystede in June 2022 as Chair and Trustee, these are both volunteer roles. He worked for many years in global corporations before setting up his own business where he advises a wide range of companies on strategic planning, cost control, fundraising and operational efficiencies. He has had Border Collies all his life and can be seen most days walking on the South Downs with Alfie.

We caught up with Derwyn recently to get his impressions of his first few months at Raystede.

Q: How have you found your first few months?

A: It has been an interesting and humbling first six months. We have the most amazing people working for us, including all the volunteers who give up their time to help us provide a better life for all the animals we look after. It's also been a steep learning curve for me getting to understand what everyone does and trying to remember everyone's name.



Q: What have you learned about or from Raystede that has particularly surprised and delighted you?

A: The importance of education when choosing and looking after your animals. As a dog owner I have always been aware of what it takes to look after an animal, but through talking with the Education Team, I have realised even more the need for us to build awareness with the public on the responsibility of owning an animal.

Q: What do you think are the challenges facing Raystede at the moment?

A: Raystede relies entirely on the generosity of our supporters and without their kind donations we would not be able to provide the care that we do. These donations will continue to be very important to us and, at a time when we know many people are facing their own financial challenges, we must continue to raise awareness of the great work that we do and the need for their much-needed support.

Q: What are your hopes for the future for Raystede?

A: The needs and requirements in animal welfare will continue to change and we need to ensure that as an organisation we change with them to ensure that we are doing what is best for the animals we look after. I want Raystede to be recognised even more than we are at the moment for all the great work that we do, and to continue to be a place where everyone loves to work. I have learnt very quickly that Raystede is an amazing place Please continue to do what you do and help us spread the word so we can become even better.

Guinness' Story

The community Education Team have been working hard in the Eastbourne area. Meet Guinness, a dog whose owner was given some invaluable advice by our dog behaviourist, Lyndsey Lear.

Guinness and her owner, Jane, first visited the Community stall in Hailsham town centre. Guinness had already had multiple homes and Jane was desperate to make hers successful.

Guinness had severe separation anxiety, and was damaging things when Jane had to leave him. Lyndsey, our dog behaviourist, taught Jane about introducing 'micro absences' and building up to longer periods of absence over time. She explained that Jane could create opportunities for Guinness to become more confident alone, if she used a stair gate so that Guinness could be left alone in different areas in the house.

Jane returned to our community stall five times in the proceeding weeks and recently reported that the advice she received from Lyndsey and the practical application of such, has been life-changing for her and Guinness. She received ongoing support from Raystede and feels it really has made the difference between this home working or Guinness needing to be surrendered, as Jane didn't feel she could cope.

The next leg of the community tour is in the Brighton area.






Our new Adoption Information Mornings initiative was featured in Hailsham News and V2 Radio Sussex.
